## 5. Buildings

The Department of Theatre Studies uses the following buildings:

- a) **Central Teaching Rooms** (Vasileos Georgiou & Irakleous St.): the building houses faculty offices, a teaching classroom equipped with a fully functional audiovisual system and computer, a lecture room with screening, dance and music facilities, the Library, the computer laboratory for students, the technological equipment office, and the multimedia studio.
- b) **Administrative Services and Teaching Building** (21 Vasileos Konstantinou & Terzaki Street): this neoclassical building of the Old Gallery houses teaching rooms equipped with a fully functional audiovisual system and computer, the Department's administrative services, and offices of faculty members and teaching staff.
- c) **Scenography Room** (25 Mikras Asias & Konstantinou Palaiologou Street), where classes in scenography and drawing take place.
- d) **Teaching Facilities of the School of Fine Arts in Aria** (Retali Street). Since the academic year 2021–2022, the Department of Theatre Studies has had at its disposal a new building in Aria, Nafplion, following the completion of a procedure conducted by the University of the Peloponnese for the leasing of new premises. This building houses faculty offices, classrooms equipped with a fully functional audiovisual system and computer, a lecture and events hall, a dance and music teaching room, sound and lighting installation rooms, a computer and digital applications laboratory for teaching purposes and student use, a rehearsal space, costume-design equipment, an indoor theatre, and a student common room.

The redevelopment of the Nafplion Tobacco Warehouses site is currently under way. The Departments of the School of Fine Arts will be relocated to that site. The project is expected to be completed in 2026.

## B. UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMME AND OBJECTIVES OF THE DEPARTMENT

The Department of Theatre Studies of the School of Fine Arts of the University of the Peloponnese aims to provide students with theoretical and practical education in the theory and art of theatre, as defined in the founding statement of the Department of Theatre Studies (see Presidential Decree 118, Government Gazette 102/5-5-2003, issue A).

According to Article 3ζ, the mission of the Department of Theatre Studies is:

- I) to cultivate and advance knowledge of the art and science of Theatre Studies; to combine theatrical practice with theoretical reflection, philological analysis and research methodology.
- II) to provide students with the necessary skills that ensure their comprehensive training for an academic and professional career.
- III) to organise postgraduate studies leading to the training of scholars with specialised knowledge in individual fields of study within the Department.
- IV) to contribute to the study of theatre at an international level.

### 1. Undergraduate Programme of Studies

The undergraduate programme of studies of the Department of Theatre Studies is a four-year programme structured across eight semesters. It comprises theatre-studies courses, theoretical courses, and laboratory-based courses focusing on diverse aspects of theatre, the performing arts, and artistic practice, with the aim of enabling students to acquire experiential and theatre-studies skills, as well as the practical knowledge required for directing, analysing and producing event of performance.

The curriculum aims to enhance both the academic and artistic identity of the Department of Theatre Studies through the strengthening of its research activity. More specifically, it seeks to reinforce the scientific, artistic, and educational profile of the Department through two specialisations:

- a) Specialisation in “Theatre Studies and Interdisciplinary Research”
- b) Specialisation in “Theatre Directing and Stage Arts”.

#### **Specialisation in “Theatre Studies and Interdisciplinary Research”**

The Specialisation in “Theatre Studies and Interdisciplinary Research” aims to strengthen the theatre-studies and interdisciplinary orientation of the Department of Theatre Studies, foregrounding its contribution to contemporary theoretical and research approaches to the performing arts through a wide range of academic fields of the Humanities such as Theatre Studies, History, Archaeology, Anthropology, Art History,



Philosophy, Philology, and Film Studies. Furthermore, this specialisation contributes to the enhancement of the Department's profile by fostering dialogue between Theatre Studies and different scientific fields such as digital humanities, cultural documentation, information technology and related areas. The "Theatre Studies and Interdisciplinary Research" specialisation provides a broad and enriched programme of studies, aligned with contemporary developments in the field of the performing arts, with the aim of actively contributing to the Department's international orientation.

### **Specialisation in "Theatre Directing and Stage Arts"**

The Specialisation in "Theatre Directing and Stage Arts" provides an enhanced artistic education at university level, with particular emphasis on the field of theatre directing. The specialisation focuses on contemporary directing practices, such as devised theatre, documentary theatre, Viewpoints, theatre in the public space, participatory theatre, and related practices. Through a range of laboratory-based subjects related to theatre and the performing arts (including acting, dance, scenography, costume design, physical theatre, and multimedia), and on the basis of the principles of dramaturgy and creative writing, students are given the opportunity to cultivate instrumental skills, such as critical thinking, aesthetic cultivation and creative autonomy. These constitute the foundations of the directing process and provide students with the means so that they may integrate and participate creatively in the contemporary artistic field.

## **2. Learning Outcomes**

Upon completion of their studies, students of the Department of Theatre Studies are expected to have acquired the following knowledge and skills:

- They will have acquired academic specialisation in the field of Theatre Studies.
- They will have acquired the necessary knowledge to work as theatre scholars, experts and producers in theatre events and relevant institutions (such as festivals) and related publishing activities.
- They will have acquired a grounding in the fields of the Humanities and the Arts.
- They will be able to carry out research in accordance with international academic and research standards.
- They will have acquired basic knowledge enabling them to teach theatre-studies courses and seminars in public and private educational and cultural organisations.
- They will possess the ability and knowledge required to organise experience-based workshops in theatre pedagogy and animation.
- They will have acquired the necessary theatre-studies and interdisciplinary background to continue their studies at postgraduate level, in Greece and abroad, in the fields of theatre and, more broadly, the Humanities and the Arts.



- They will have acquired basic training in the areas of directing, acting, scenography and costume design, dance studies, and related branches of theatrical practice, which will enable them to pursue more specialised studies in these areas and to follow an artistic career.
- They will have acquired basic knowledge in artistic fields related to theatre, such as cinema, literature, dance, music, and the fine arts, with emphasis on the relation of these arts to theatre.
- They will have acquired experience in the preparation and presentation of individual and collective assignments.
- They will have acquired experience in the organisation and production of theatrical and cultural activities and events, including exhibitions, performances, lectures, and related actions.
- They will have acquired experience in participating in performances, either as creative contributors or in the field of production.

Up to the academic year 2014–2015, the Department belonged to the Schools of Education, which ensured students the possibility of pursuing teaching as a professional career. Since the academic year 2019–2020, students of the Department of Theatre Studies have been awarded the Pedagogical and Teaching Competence Certificate, on the basis of a specific programme of compulsory pedagogical courses that have been incorporated and approved of. Transitional provisions have also been established for the retroactive award of this Certificate to students registered between the academic years 2015–2016 and 2018–2019.

### 3. Possible professional routes for the graduates of the Department of Theatre Studies

The graduates are capable of utilizing their knowledge in theatre studies and of being actively involved in the field of theatre and the performing arts, in education and in the broader area of culture, according to the learning outcomes of the Programme. More specifically, they can pursue a career in the following professions as:

- teachers at all levels of the educational process, given that they are awarded the Pedagogical and Teaching Competence Certificate, according to the current regulations of the Ministry of Education (primary and secondary education, secondary arts schools, continuing education schools, state and private professional colleges, educational institutes and other centres for lifelong learning, drama schools, schools for directing, dance and cinema, music schools, etc.).
- specialised advisors on cultural issues: cultural resources managers, advisors on arts programming and production, managers of artistic activities in state and private institutions (Ministries, the local authorities, festivals, theatres, museums,



centres for the arts, culture and education, archives and libraries, research institutions and centres, social organisations, the media, etc.).

- theatre and performing arts professionals, including artists, directors, producers, scenographers, costume designers, assistant creative personnel, multimedia and digital installation artists, performers, technical specialists, and arts facilitators, who are qualified to work in cultural and artistic organisations (including theatres, museums, and exhibition spaces), across the cultural, tourism, and creative industries, as well as in community-based and socially engaged contexts, particularly with vulnerable and marginalised social groups.
- members of theatre organisations: theatre experts, curators of programmes and activities of theatre and the performing arts in state and private theatre organisations (state theatre institutions, the National Theatre, various public theatre organisations all over Greece, sponsored and free theatre, festivals, etc.).
- journalists, columnists and reporters for cultural issues, editors, drama and art critics: in the media and in publishing (the daily and periodic press, the electronic press, radio, television, publishing houses).
- The graduates of the Theatre Studies Department have also the appropriate background and have acquired the necessary academic and artistic knowledge so that they may continue their studies and embark on a postgraduate degree or doctoral research in Greece or abroad, with a view to pursuing an academic career in higher education and in state or private cultural, academic or research institutions. Finally, after graduation, they may become members of the Hellenic Theatre Studies Association.

#### 4. Structure of the Programme of Studies

From the academic year 2025–2026 onwards, in order to complete their degree successfully, students are required to attend and take an examination in a total of **fifty (50) courses**, or **forty-eight (48) courses**, if a student undertakes a final year dissertation, or **forty-six (46) courses**, if a student completes an internship, or **forty-four (44) courses**, if a student undertakes both a dissertation and an internship.

Courses are classified into the following categories: **compulsory core courses, compulsory elective courses, compulsory specialisation courses, specialisation elective courses, and free elective courses.**

More specifically, the curriculum comprises twenty-seven (27) compulsory core courses, extending across the four years of study, and a total of twenty-three (23) elective courses — compulsory specialisation courses, specialisation elective courses, and free elective courses — distributed according to the requirements of each specialisation, thereby allowing students to focus more closely on their academic objectives.



As free elective courses, students may select courses from:

- the list of free elective courses;
- the specialisation elective courses of their own specialisation;
- the compulsory elective courses carrying 5 ECTS credits;
- the specialisation elective courses of the other specialisation, according to the prerequisites of the respective courses.

Furthermore, during the academic year 2025–2026, students are offered the opportunity to select one free elective course per semester from the free elective courses offered by the Department of Performing and Digital Arts.

Students may change specialisation during the course of studies, by converting courses already attended into free elective courses, provided that these courses do not belong to the specialisation ultimately selected.

#### 4.1. Specialisation “Theatre Studies and Interdisciplinary Research”

For the Specialisation “Theatre Studies and Interdisciplinary Research”, students are required to attend a total of twenty-three (23) elective courses, classified as follows:

- **seventeen (17) specialisation elective courses** from the list of courses of the Specialisation “Theatre Studies and Interdisciplinary Research”, and
- **six (6) free elective courses** from the full range of free elective courses offered by the Department, as specified above.

#### 4.2. Specialisation “Theatre Directing and Stage Arts”

Students wishing to follow the Specialisation in “Theatre Directing and Stage Arts” must have successfully completed two (2) courses:

a) **the compulsory core course “Introduction to Stage Practice: Theory and Practice”**, 1st semester, and

b) **one (1) of the three (3) compulsory elective courses**, 2nd semester: “Introduction to Theatre Lighting: Practical Applications”, or “Costume in the Performing Arts: Introductory Concepts”, or “Introduction to Physical Theatre: Practical Applications”.

If a student fails both the examination and the September resit examination in these courses, they will have to follow the Specialisation “Theatre Studies and Interdisciplinary Research”.

For the Specialisation “Theatre Directing and Stage Arts”, students are required to attend a total of twenty-three (23) elective courses, distributed as follows:

- **seventeen (17) specialisation elective courses.**



Students are required to take six (6) courses related to the field of Directing: “Introduction to the Elements of Directing”, “Theatrical Practices: Introductory Concepts”, “Directing I”, “Directing II”, “Directing III: Devised Theatre”, and “Directing IV”. They then complete their course requirements with eleven (11) specialisation elective courses from the pool of courses of the Specialisation in “Theatre Directing and Stage Arts”.

- **six (6) free elective courses** from the full range of free elective courses offered by the Department, as specified above.
- The course “Theatrical Practices: Introductory Elements” (winter semester) and the course “Introduction to the Elements of Directing” (spring semester) are prerequisites and must be taken and successfully completed before students may take “Directing I”, “Directing II”, “Directing III” and “Directing IV”.
- The courses “Directing III: Devised Theatre”, “Directing IV”, and “Theatre Production” are offered only to fourth-year students.
- All art-oriented courses bearing Roman numerals — I, II, III, and so forth — are interdependent prerequisites of one another. Students are required to attend and be examined in these courses in the prescribed ascending order.

## 5. Distribution of ECTS Credits

On the basis of the students’ workload for each course, the allocation of ECTS credits to courses is as follows.

### 5.1. First-Year Compulsory Core Courses

First-year compulsory core courses correspond to four (4) ECTS credits and, accordingly, carry a weighting factor of one and a half (1.5). These are, for the most part, introductory courses that lay the foundations of the programme of studies.

The courses “Introduction to Stage Practice: Theory and Practice” and “Introduction to Scenography: Theory and Practice” are exempted from this rule, as each corresponds to five (5) ECTS credits due to the combination of theory and practice. The two Free Elective courses also correspond to 5 ECTS credits, since they provide the opportunity for in-depth engagement with more specific fields of knowledge or artistic practice.

### 5.2. Compulsory Core Courses of the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Years

Compulsory core courses of the 2nd, 3rd and 4th years carry five (5) ECTS credits each, due to the increased cognitive demands and the overall workload they entail. They carry a weighting factor of one and a half (1.5).



### 5.3. Specialisation Courses

The specialisation courses (compulsory specialisation courses, specialisation elective courses, and free elective courses) constitute advanced courses. They presuppose the undertaking of written assignments and/or artistic projects and, consequently, carry five (5) ECTS credits each. Accordingly, they carry a weighting factor of one and a half (1.5). Students' academic specialisation in either of the two streams is shaped through the attendance and successful completion of the full set of elective courses, as defined in the programme of studies.

The title of the specialization a student has selected and successfully completed shall be indicated on their degree certificate.

### 5.4. Final Year Dissertation

Within the framework of the Programme of Studies, students are given the option of undertaking a final year Dissertation in the 8th semester, which corresponds to two (2) free elective courses. The Dissertation is undertaken by individual students and may not be the result of collaboration among several students.

The timely and successful completion of the course "Methodology of Theatre Research I" is a prerequisite for undertaking a Dissertation in the 8th semester. In addition, students who submit an application to undertake a Dissertation must have no more than seven (7) remaining courses in total to complete their degree.

The final year Dissertation corresponds to two (2) free elective courses for students registered in the academic year 2019–2020 and onwards, and to four (4) free elective courses for students registered in the academic year 2018–2019 and earlier. Consequently, the Dissertation corresponds to ten (10) ECTS credits or twenty (20) ECTS credits respectively.

### 5.5. Internship

In accordance with the decision of the 59th/15.07.2022 Assembly of the Department of Theatre Studies, students registered from the academic year 2019–2020 onwards undertake a paid Internship, carried out in cooperation with cultural or educational organisations outside the University. The Internship is offered as an optional course, corresponds to 20 ECTS credits, and is equivalent to four (4) free elective courses. The Internship has a duration of three months (five days per week, eight hours per day).

The possibility to undertake an Internship from the 5th semester of studies is granted to:  
a) students registered in the academic years 2022–2023 and 2023–2024, and



b) students in the final stage of their studies, who have registered up to and including academic year 2021–2022. For students registered in subsequent academic years, the eligibility requirements for undertaking an Internship shall be determined anew.

The Internship Regulations of the Department of Theatre Studies and the Dissertation Regulations, which constitute integral parts of the Programme of Studies, are available on the Department's website.

In accordance with the above, the total requirements that students must fulfil in order to be awarded the degree correspond to a minimum of two hundred and forty (240) ECTS credits (30 credits per semester). Consequently, the Department's Programme of Studies is fully equivalent to all four-year undergraduate study programmes within the European Higher Education Area.

## 6. Teaching and Pedagogical Competence Certificate

Since the academic year 2019-2020, a Teaching and Pedagogical Competence Certificate Programme has been incorporated into the Programme of Studies. Consequently, upon



completion of their degree, all students of the Department are awarded a Teaching and Pedagogical Competence Certificate.

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## 8. Code of Practice for Theoretical and Practical Courses

This Code should be consulted in conjunction with the General Regulations of the Department, the General Regulations of the University, the Student Handbook, and the regulations of the Unit for Quality Assurance, the Gender Equality and Anti-Discrimination Committee, and the Ethics Committee of the University of the Peloponnese.

### **Communication with Members of Faculty and Teaching Staff**

It is advised that students communicate with their tutors during their office hours, via Eclass, via email or in person after arranging an appointment. The email addresses and office hours of all tutors are available on the Department's webpage.

In case of communication via email, student queries should be expressed in a clear and concrete way, taking into account that a tutor may not always be in a position to read or respond to the query immediately. Students should be discouraged from contacting tutors and from asking for favourable treatment in relation to their examination for a specific course (e.g., to be allowed to undertake written coursework when no such mode of examination is available for a course).

### **Examinations**

A piece of written coursework does not constitute a sufficient way of examining and evaluating a student's progress in all courses (compulsory, specialisation elective, free elective). In courses where the mode of examination includes written coursework, this should be combined with another mode of examination (e.g., progress test, final written exam, oral exam).

The more practical and art-oriented courses are examined in two stages: a) by presentations/performances (during the semester or in the first week of the examinations period or after that period), and b) by final exam, oral examination, written coursework or art portfolios.

### **Student Attendance and Participation in Courses and Events**



A fundamental principle of the educational process of providing and producing knowledge in the context of the University is the regular attendance of students at the courses for which they register. This holds for both theoretical and practical courses and constitutes an indication of proper academic and artistic practice. Presence in-person in the class is mandatory in case the tutor requires it. Each tutor sets the minimum number of times a student may be present in-person so as to be able to participate in the course examination.

In any case, attendance of a theoretical or practical course means that students should be present on time for classes, that they do not interrupt the process of teaching by being late, and that they attend each class until it is completed.

In the case of events organised by the Department, participating and attending students should also be present on time and avoid interrupting the event by moving about or by leaving before the end of the event. Students will be informed about departmental events by visiting the webpage and via Eclass, and some of those events may be compulsory if they are integral parts of specific courses according to the course tutor.

Student participation in the organisation, completion and attendance of departmental events (lectures, performances, workshops, etc.) is deemed to be a necessary part of studying at the Department of Theatre Studies, as well as of the academic and artistic experience that contributes to and strengthens the community of the Department.

Similarly, members of faculty and teaching staff ought to carry out their teaching and administrative commitments according to their duties, to comply with the rules of academic conduct, and to promote respect for others and ethical behaviour in the context of their courses, among the students and between the teaching and the administrative staff.

### **Information and Deadlines**

Students are required to register promptly on the Eclass webpages of the courses they have taken, to visit regularly the administration Announcements webpage as well as announcements made by individual course tutors, and to keep the deadlines set by tutors or the administration of the Department.

In the **Students' Handbook**, which is available online, students will find information about proper academic practice and their studies. They are expected to read carefully the Students' Handbook (<https://ts.uop.gr/egheiridio-foititon>).

Students are also expected to read carefully the Guidelines for Writing Coursework, available online, and to follow all the relevant rules concerning the composition and submission of written coursework.

### **Regulations about art-oriented and laboratory courses**



- 1) In the art-oriented and laboratory courses offered within the B.A. Programme of Studies (including compulsory courses, specialisation elective and free elective course that lead to artistic presentations, performances, exhibitions, or similar forms of artistic output), students are required, in addition to the scheduled weekly classes, to participate in independent weekly rehearsals and/or meetings in smaller working groups.
- 2) Attendance at the art-oriented and laboratory courses and at independent rehearsals and meetings is formally mandatory in the context of the collaborative nature of artistic work and as an expression of the principles of artistic professionalism and ethics, as outlined above. The tutor of each course determines the minimum of required attendance at classes and rehearsals/meetings so that students may be eligible to sit the final examination of the course. In case a session or a class is cancelled and is rescheduled to take place on another day and time, this is considered a regular teaching session or class and students are required to attend. This is the case for both specialisations.
- 3) Under no circumstances should rehearsals, meetings, or rescheduled classes take place at the same time as other courses attended by the participating students, unless there has been a prior arrangement on the part of the tutors involved.
- 4) Independent weekly rehearsals and meetings within the framework of art-oriented and laboratory courses shall take place in available institutional facilities, in accordance with the room schedule maintained by Mr Skoufoulas or another designated member of staff.
- 5) It is recommended that weekly rehearsals and preparation activities for art-oriented and laboratory courses should begin early on during the semester. As a general rule, such activities should amount to at least two to four hours per week per course.
- 6) Intensive rehearsals and preparation sessions may be held only during the periods designated by the Department and the course tutors so as not to interfere with the smooth operation of the theoretical courses.
- 7) Unless otherwise agreed, the scheduling of intensive rehearsals, meetings, and artistic presentations shall be confined to the period extending from Week 13 to Week 15 of the teaching semester, the first week of the examination period, and/or the week immediately after the final day of the examination period. Tutors of art-oriented and laboratory courses shall coordinate with one another to ensure that students' obligations in artistic courses do not overlap and shall jointly determine the sequence of performances and presentations.
- 8) In art-oriented and laboratory courses, as well as during independent rehearsals and meetings, there are certain essential requirements: mutual respect among



students, professional and ethical conduct, punctuality with regard to arrival and departure times, cleanliness and adherence to hygiene standards, proper care of facilities and equipment, and observance of designated quiet hours. In the event of damage, the users are responsible for repairing or replacing, at their own expense, the damaged equipment.

- 9) All promotional material relating to student performances and presentations must include the name and logo of the University, the title of the course and the name of the tutor in charge of the course.
